Ash Wednesday is February 14th. Because it is Valentine's day we won't be having an evening service. Instead, I will be available in the sanctuary from **3-4 pm** to offer prayer, anointing and ashes. Feel free to drop by as you are able. We will have our annual Holy Thursday service on March 29th at 7:00 pm.

I have been talking with Christy Powell, a church member and art teacher at Stephen Decatur High School, about a **4-week adult art class** for Lent. We are thinking of offering it on **Wednesdays from 6-7 pm** beginning **March 7**th, depending on interest. **We will limit participation to 20**. Christy calls the class "*Expressions in Watercolor*". The idea is for participants to discuss the scriptures of Lent as they become familiar with the properties and techniques of watercolor. Participants will then select a scripture and illustrate it in a watercolor painting. Adult art classes are becoming a "new thing" in local hangouts, so we thought this might be something that would appeal to some members of the congregation and their friends. We'll keep you posted.

Church Planning Retreat Update – Pastor Patty

26 members and friends of Atlantic UMC met with Rev. Jack Shitama at a Church Planning Retreat on January 13th. It was an uplifting day where we focused on the strengths of the church. There are many!

Out of these discussions, using feedback from retreat participants, Rev. Shitama developed a 1-year strategic plan to build upon the church's strengths during 2018. He presented the plan to the Administrative Council on January 23rd. It was approved and is included below. The plan is designed to build on current strengths of the church with the overall goal of increasing worship attendance by 25% in 2018. A Lead Team has been recruited to help set quarterly goals. After the goals are approved by the Administrative Council, the Lead Team will connect with existing committees and ministries to move the goals forward. Having quarterly goals will help the church to remain on target so that there will be a sense of forward motion and vitality in the congregation. I hope you will join the Administrative Council in embracing this opportunity so that Atlantic United Methodist Church can be a place *Where Active Adults Grow and Thrive!* Please feel free to contact an Administrative Council member (roster posted on the church bulletin board) a member of the Lead Team or myself if you have any questions.

I will be meeting with members of the Lead Team in February to develop the first quarter goals. We hope to have them approved by the Council at its February 27th meeting. I look forward to what lies ahead and am excited about the things God has in store for this church! Thanks for your prayers and support.

Atlantic United Methodist Church Strategic Focus Document Prepared by Rev. Jack Shitama January 23, 2018

Establishing an Identity

An identity will help the congregation establish a mental picture of who they are and who they want to become. I recommend the following:

Where Active Adults Grow and Thrive

The demographics of the church and the surrounding community indicate that there is a good fit between the current congregation and those who are moving to the area. This is important because new residents are the most likely to consider attending Atlantic, much more so than members of other churches, non-Christians or lapsed Christians.

The term "active" does not limit the focus to older and/or retired adults. However, it is intended to resonate with people who have "life experience" but still consider themselves having a lot to offer. It certainly does not preclude appealing to younger adults. <u>Studies show</u> that millennial adults value intergenerational relationships. AUMC is well-positioned for intergenerational ministry with young adults.

That being said, the purpose of this identity will be to focus on creating momentum and organizational strength by increasing worship attendance and active participation in congregational life over the next year. This will come mainly from older adults who have recently moved to the area.

One Big Goal: Increase Total Average Worship Attendance by 25%

One of the bright spots mentioned at the planning retreat was the music ministry. My sense is that Sunday morning worship is not the issue at AUMC. There are excellent services for both traditional and contemporary worship. The areas of focus are designed to connect current members with potential new members in ways that will enable them to make personal invitations to worship at AUMC on Sunday morning.

AUMC is at a point where it needs to increase its ability to resource ministry. This requires increasing the number of people who offer their prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness. The focus on attracting active adults is the fastest route to do this. It can not only stabilize the congregation financially and strengthen its ministry, it can enhance an already great Sunday morning experience by increasing the number of people who want to participate in the music ministries of both services.

If this one-year goal is reached, AUMC can then discern to pivot to those who are not well-represented in the congregation such as families with children. It is inadvisable to do this right now because the amount of change required will take time and resources.

Further, families with children tend to be pressed financially and will not add to the financial strength of the ministry. This is not a reason to ignore them, but is a reality that must be acknowledged. AUMC must regain its strength before it is in a position to make a concentrated and sustained effort to reach young families.

Three Areas of Focus

Quarterly goals will be established in the following three areas:

1. Fellowship Events. This was by far the most significant "bright spot" that came out of our time together. AUMC leadership raved about their experiences. The excitement is contagious. This should be seen as a primary way to attract new, active adults. It can also

be a low-key way to connect or reconnect with the children and grandchildren of current members. Assuming there is a quarterly fellowship event, then the emphasis should be on reaching new people to attend by:

- a. Personal invitation.
- **b.** Identifying new residents and extending invitations through personal invitation, direct mail and/or email. Any of these means should also include an invitation to Sunday worship. The most likely people to respond to a Fellowship Event invitation are those who were active in a church in their previous community and are looking to connect in their new community.
- 2. Opportunities to serve. AUMC has outstanding opportunities to serve including, but not limited to, the Thrift Shop, the Soup Kitchen and the Backpack Ministry. This is a proven way to connect active adults of all ages who want to make a difference for others in need. The Christian journey is more than just fellowship. By connecting new persons to an outreach ministry, this strengthens the connections to Jesus and AUMC, helping to increase the likelihood of staying connected to both.
- **3. Small group ministries**. This is the third and most important component. Spiritual growth is essential to a vibrant faith and a vibrant church. This can be seen as a portal, where new persons are invited to connect with Jesus and the AUMC community, and as a means of grace for all. Small groups encompass Bible studies, discussion groups and support groups that help people navigate specific life challenges such as grief, divorce and personal finance. Some possible ways to expand include:
 - a. Adjusting Sunday worship times to include a Christian Education Hour.
 - **b.** Offering Disciple Bible Study.
 - **c.** Encouraging active participation in Walk to Emmaus.
 - **d.** Forming groups that meet via electronic means such as Google Hangouts or Zoom.
 - e. Forming a "pub" ministry focused on reaching young adults.

Establish a Lead Team

While the current governing structures should still approve any plans, a Lead Team of approximately 5-6 persons should be selected to move things forward. Three months goes quickly. This is precisely why quarterly goals are helpful. They create a sense of urgency. However, they will not be achieved through a traditional governing structure. They require action and decisiveness. Lead Team members should be recruited by the pastor and approved by the administrative council.

Miss Ida's Rum Cake Recipe. For many years, Miss Ida's has baked her very special Rum Cake for fundraisers and special events, requested and enjoyed by so many. We thank Miss Ida for sharing her recipe with her AUMC Family!

Ida Laynor Rum Cabe (no substitutets) 3/4 c chopped pecans 1 (181/2 og) ph Duncan Hines yellow butter cake mix 1 (3-3/4 oz)-pb French vanella instant pudding + pie mix 1/2 c regular rum 1/2 c water 1/2 c salad oil 4 regular eggs Hot Rum Hlage (Welow) Preheat oven to 325° F. Brease a 10" tube pan (or Bundt pan). Aprinkla chopped nuts over bottom. Combine cake mix, pudding mix, rum water, oil, and eggs, Best with nixer 2 to 4 minutes at medium speed. Pour into pan, Bake at 325° for 50 to 60 minutes. Pour Hot Rum Blage over not cake while still in pan. Cake may settle. allow cake to tool in pan before turning out. Hot Rum Blaze 1 cup sugar 1/2 cup butter 14 ces regular rum 1/4 cup water Combiner in pan. Boil 2 to 3 minutes right before cake is done. Pour over that cake in gan. Best made day before use, Kaeps well.
