#### MESSAGE FROM PASTOR JOE

## What Lessons of Life We Should We Learn?

Just recently a Christian living in Montreal wrote a blog, the Ten Plagues of 2019-2020. Of course, I don't buy into any thought that God is sending plagues against humanity!! Nor, do I buy into any end-times prophecies about a coming

Tribulation. I prefer not to guess or speculate about the Second Coming of Christ!

Yet, her evidence was alarming, in light of events around the world. Here's a brief synopsis:

- 1) A month ago wine flowed through faucets in lieu of water in Italy. (Water into blood)
- 2) The University of Queensland (Australia) was overrun with Cane Toads after significant downpours of rain; and deadly toxic toads in large amounts in Florida yards (Frogs covering the land of Egypt)
- 3) Starving monkey gangs in Thailand
- 4) One billion (estimated) million animals dead in Australia due to wildfire
- The Ten Plagues 2019-2020

- 5) Hail falling in Delhi, India and gold-sized hail then blinding dust storms again in Australia
- 6) Hundreds of Billions of locusts ravaging on East Africa

- 7) Darkness covering the earth due wildfires 'Down Under' (getting tired of writing Australia!)
- 8) Seniors and the informed dying due to Coronavirus (death of the first-born)

This list does look scary, but, once again, 2020 aren't plagues sent by God. Yet, they are happening and one has to wonder, 'What should we learn from all this?"

I believe the Book of James speaks to our lives today: **James 1:2-4** <sup>2</sup> My brothers and sisters, think of the various tests you encounter as occasions for joy. <sup>3</sup> After all, you know that the testing of your faith produces endurance. <sup>4</sup> Let this endurance complete its work so that you may be fully mature, complete, and lacking in nothing. (CEB)

This passage points out that problems WILL come! Sometimes NUMEROUS (or various) problems WILL come. Another Bible translation reads "When all kinds of trials CROWD INTO your lives ... as INTRUDERS..." Then James says, the purpose of these numerous problems are for three different reasons, from this passage. 1) To test your faith, 2) To produce endurance, and 3) To make you mature and complete.

So, what do we do in the midst of these problems in life?

A) REJOICE IN the problems. "Think of these occasions as opportunities to be joyful. B) ASK GOD to give you more faith. In verse 7, James writes that if you lack anything, ask God and God will give to you generously! C) BE REAL with how you feel about your doubts. In verse 8 James writes, ask in sincere faith. That means be real with yourself about your secret doubts and ask for more faith. Then, 4) CONTINUE TO ENDURE faithfully IN the midst of the problems. Going back to verse 4, James writes, "Let endurance complete its work..."




We are planning for the Church and campus to have a very detailed and complete cleaning. It will be fresh and ready when the opportunity comes to reopen – Hopefully soon.


