On October 3, AUMC celebrated Communion with Pastor Patterson inviting congregants to the altar. This in one step toward our congregation returning to a normal form of worship. Thank you to everyone assisting with this. Our goal is to continue returning our worship services to a pre-pandemic time.

Also, thank you to those answering the call to participate as a greeter, usher, or both. This has lessened the burden on all those serving. A training class/refresher course will be announced soon.

The "ordinary – green" season for the church will soon come to an end the end of November when we enter the season of Advent. During this season the Altar Guild and Worship Committee will transform the church by adding the Chrismon ornaments to the Christmas tree. What are Chrismon ornaments?

Chrismons, meaning "Christ monograms," traditionally are white and gold designs made from Christian symbols that signify Christ. Often displayed on an evergreen tree during the Christmas season, symbols such as stars, crosses, fish, crowns, and the alpha and omega remind us of Christ's identity, his story, and of the Holy Trinity. Chrismons were first developed in 1957 by Frances Spencer and the women of the <u>Ascension Lutheran Church</u> in Danville, VA.

Alpha and Omega are the first and last letters in the Greek alphabet. Used together, they symbolize that Christians believe Jesus is the beginning and the end of all things
